Grace flows through the sacraments and is felt tangibly in the solidarity that is the Body of Christ. In our broken and busy world and lives, it can be hard to fit it in. Life in community, just like exercise, when done infrequently can be awkward and uncomfortable. However, when it is a regular, consistent part of our lives, a missed Sunday can feel like a real loss.

So celebrate this new season with a resolution to make Grace #aplaceforgrace for you personally where you are regularly buoyed as a member of the Body of Christ. See you soon!

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

The Three-legged Stool

Most churches have three types of funds: like a three-legged stool, good balance is maintained if all three legs work together. Those legs are:

- Operating Fund supports the annual operating budget, including personnel, facilities and day-to-day expenses.
- · Capital Fund supports maintenance and ongoing building improvements.
- Endowment Fund supports various specific ministries of the church. It is the church's "savings account" and ensures a strong financial foundation. Often these take the form of a bequest in your will, an insurance policy, an IRA or 401K retirement benefit plan or stock, bonds, real estate, and property.



Endowment or Legacy gifts are often the ultimate gift made from one's estate, and represent careful planning and prayerful consideration. No matter the size, a Legacy Gift is a personal statement of gratitude in the form of financial support for Grace Lutheran Church that will last forever.



On Reformation Sunday, Prof. Hans Wiersma (Augsburg College) will lead Adult Forum on the Lutheran Reformation. During November, there will be two adult study options on Sunday morning between services. On November 2 and 9, Vicar Nikoli will lead two Adult Forum sessions in the Chapel on his current work at the Seminary. On November 2, 9, and 16, Pastor Matt will lead a three-session Bible Study on the Gospel of Mark, from 9:45-10:30 in the Library. 
God's Work, Our Hands

Here at Grace Lutheran Church, dedicated members are involved in counting and recording contributions to ensure that everyone's offering finds its proper place. The co-financial secretaries, Sunday counting teams, and the bookkeeper extraordinaire take great care with all envelopes and bank-generated transfers to ensure funds reach the intended goal.

Some members have asked: Do 100% of my contributions over the year go toward fulfilling my annual Operating Fund pledge? The answer is not so simple. Any gifts marked for special purposes or enclosed in special envelopes (e.g. 2015 Youth Gathering, Seminary

Scholarship Fund, Music Fund, Christmas, Easter, etc.) are applied specifically to that fund or budget item and are considered above and beyond one's annual pledge to the Operating Fund.

We are deeply grateful to the many Grace members who pledge annually. These pledges are the basis for Operating Fund budgeting at Grace. Operating Fund pledges guide Church Council decisions related to program choices, staffing, insurance, power/water, and benevolence from Grace Lutheran Palo Alto to ministries beyond our campus. Each dollar received is carefully recorded and accounted for by the Sunday counting teams and co-financial secretaries.

Thursday Morning Bible Study




God's Work, **Our Hands**

Christian History is a magazine found in Grace's library... have you ever looked at it? Each issue is based on a different theme.

I took a copy home titled "Christianity in Early Africa: Ancient traditions, profound impact." Pastor Matt has been teaching us about the

Early Church, off and on, over the past few years. Two things I learned from him that I had never properly internalized before, are: the main language all around the Mediterranean Sea in the early centuries of the Christian Church was Greek, not Latin or one of the Romance languages, and the Early Church in North Africa was really very important. The Augustine, for whom Martin Luther's order of Augustinian monks was named, was

"Augustine of Hippo," (354-430) (in Algeria, unless they've moved the border again) not "Augustine of Canterbury," who brought Christianity to the South of England a good couple of centuries later. Tertullian, from Carthage, (Tunisia,

mind that border!)160-220, wrote the earliest Christian treatise on the Sacraments (and many other things as well), and Clement, 150-215, from Alexandria, in Egypt, wrote letters, like Paul, containing thoughts and phrases that sound very much like quotes from the Gospels. These people were living in the second to fifth centu-

> ries of our own era—scholars, theologians, and hymnwriters, sorting out the Church's earliest thoughts about the Triune God and just how we are to live, be, and worship, as Christians.

> The magazine is full of beautiful illustrations of ancient paintings, mosaics, and ruins, and stories of many other ancient saints from North Africa. Best of all, there's a map, which I

need if I'm to orient myself with all these old folks from places that in some cases no longer exist...yet were instrumental in the furthering of the Gospel in the world.

Council Notes

At our August and September meetings, the Church Council has focused on getting the new programming year off to a strong start. Our Rally Day picnic was a great success. Pr. Matt noted it was the most well-attended one in several years. The spirit of Grace was in fine form as we reconnected with one another in fellowship and also welcomed several visitors.

The Council is also keeping a close eye on income and expenses. We are expecting to close the calendar year on budget. Longer term financial topics are also being discussed. Among them are the possibility of securing a seminary intern to start in the Fall of '15 and adjusting the budget calendar (currently January-December) to synchronize with the programming calendar (July-June). Another financial matter we're contemplating is, in future years, splitting Grace's budget into an operating budget and a capital budget. This may allow us to better manage short-term income and expenses alongside longer-term projects and investments.

Last but not least, the Council is also carefully planning the path forward as we transition from Capital Campaign fundraising to turning the congregation's visions for the campus and our ministry into reality. To that end, we have approved the formation of the Building Committee, which, as soon as volunteers have been appointed, and the congregation fives final approval, will oversee the construction phase and the associated capital spending on behalf of the congregation.

One final bit of news—Church Council members also serve as liaisons to committees at Grace. The current committee liaison assignments are listed in the side bar.
