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Stay Burning

One of my favorite texts at this time of year is from the evening of the very first Easter. Jesus had been executed a few days prior and people in devastating grief were starting to drift away... away home, leaving Jerusalem and looking bleakly forward. Two



of Jesus' followers were on the road to Emmaus and ran into a stranger as they walked who they engaged in conversation over the tragic events that had happened in Jerusalem. The stranger began to speak to them using scripture about hope in tomorrow and the promise found in Jesus death. As evening began to fall, they were about to stop for the night with the stranger continuing alone, but they begged him to stay also . . . 'stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over' (Luke 24:29).

It surprises me the number of times, in our lives of faith individually and as a community, that the Holy Spirit comes to us in a way that we don't recognize immediately. Just as the disciples didn't recognize Jesus immediately as the stranger on the road. Sometimes the Holy Spirit comes where we might expect it like worship or in some other space that we feel we have created for God, but sometimes it's not. Individually, it may be a chance encounter with a friend or even a stranger where God barges in. As a community, it may be in opportunities that we did not expect. One piece is consistent though and comes from the first Easter account as well. As the disciples were reflecting on their encounter and were surprised that they had not recognized Jesus presence with their eyes . . . they reflect, 'were not our hearts burning within us as he was talking to us on the road?' (Luke 24:32)

The Holy Spirit continues to move among us in mysterious ways. However, it often involves a burning of the heart and a sense of hope and joy in tomorrow. Still your own soul as we travel through this season of Easter, this season of Hope that your heart might also be warmed and your future be given hope.

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

Every summer, Elizabeth picks a week of camp when she can take all the youth from Grace up to have a great week of summer camp all together. I can't tell you how important camp is to the development of children and youth. It provides countless benefits for them as they grow, learn, and explore. It is a safe place for them to be truly themselves and realize that they are loved without condition by God, who created the nature around them they get to explore.



OST WORSHIPPING COMMUNITIES list the names of their staff members in their weekly bulletin, and many of those start at the top of the page: "Ministers: the baptized people of God," or some other words to that effect. The idea is this: when we gather for worship, we are **all** ministers, assembled to pray, sing, praise, celebrate communion, and be sent forth in mission. This shared leadership is based on Paul's description of the church in First Corinthians: "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." (1 Corinthians 12:12)

The ministries of the baptized are many, and include: readers, ministers of communion, prayer leaders, cantors and other musicians, ushers, greeters, and more. All of these individual ministries contribute to the health of the one body.

It is sometimes thought that we have a variety of lay people "assisting" in worship only to ease strain on the pastor, or perhaps to provide a few extra hands for the distribution of communion. The truth goes beyond that: there are actually only a few key points in the liturgy that are in fact the pastor's job: offering absolution, praying the Prayer of the Day, reading the gospel and preaching the sermon, praying the Great Thanksgiving for the bread and wine of Holy Communion, and pronouncing the blessing (benediction) as the service comes to a close. All the rest is OUR job as the baptized people of God! Even large congregations with more than one pastor on staff can and should involve as many lay people as possible in leadership at every service.

Our ushers and greeters help people feel welcome at church, and keep a special eye out for people who might be new to our community. They distribute bulletins, answer questions, and receive the offering. It's a great ministry for whole families, adults and children, to handle together.

Our **readers** prepare readings from Scripture at home and then read them clearly and expressively during worship. They can be adults, youth, or children—anyone who is able to communicate the texts in a way that helps the listeners understand what is being read. We often schedule two per service, which both allows more people to be involved in this ministry and enables the congregation to hear a greater diversity of voices.

Communion assistants help with the distribution of wine or grape juice at Holy Communion. This is a relatively easy task (all you need is a fairly steady hand for pouring from the chalice!) and usually requires four people at every service.

You've probably never thought of the **choir** and other musicians as ministers, but they are as well! Whether they are leading all of us in our singing of hymns and responses, or performing other music as proclamation or prayer, the ministry of music is an important way for many to express their baptismal calling.

The **Assisting Minister**, far from being "pastor's helper," fills an important role that is historically parallel to that of an ordained deacon. (This is still an ordained ministry in some denominations.) The Assisting Minister leads many of the prayers during worship, most notably the Prayers of Intercession. In some congregations, the Assisting Minister might actually be trained to write these prayers personally in advance. In other places (including at Grace), the prayers are adapted from a published model. The Assisting Minister is responsible for preparing the table for the celebration of Holy Communion, and often distributes bread alongside the pastor. Some Assisting Ministers may chant the psalm or other liturgical music if they are comfortable doing so and well-rehearsed, but singing is

The Altar Guild works behind the scenes to prepare the bread, wine, and tableware for Holy Communion each week, usually setting up on Saturdays and cleaning up after worship on Sundays. Although you usually can't see them during worship, their ministry is priceless!

not a requirement for performing this role.

In addition to my music responsibilities, I've been coordinating the schedule for our lay ministers since this past fall. We currently have about 75 people serving in one or

This year we decided to do something a little different during Lent and we planned 5 weeks of an evening service with prayers and service. We also transformed the sanctuary to feel more intimate.



Update from the Building Team

You may recall from the previous edition of Grace Notes that the near-term focus of the Building Team was to select a general contractor who will oversee the construction effort that will:

- 1. take our Phase I plans
- 2. examine them in excruciating detail
- 3. figure out what the entire project will cost
- 4. help convince the Congregation, and then the City, that we have excellent plans
- 5. add shingles, bricks, glass, asphalt (and, of course, other materials that are more alluring, but which will be revealed at a later time)
- 6. build this thing!

On the basis of two-hour interviews and evaluations of background materials submitted by each of the two candidate firms, we came to the unanimous conclusion that W. L. Butler Construction, Inc., is the company best suited to bringing Grace's Phase I plan into reality. Both candidates had successfully completed projects of similar size and scope to ours for non-profit clients, and both were commended by architects who had worked with them and by our in-house voice of experience, Doug Hohbach. A key distinguishing factor in Butler's favor was the formality and level of organization used in executing their construction projects. Butler prides itself on the efficiency and regularity of communications among the project team of builder, architect, and client. Once the project gets underway, there are weekly meetings to update all interested parties on project status versus schedule and budget, key decisions that must be made (and by whom and by when) to keep the project on schedule, any issues that have arisen, and selection of any subcontractors involved in upcoming work. All of the proceedings and associated decisions are documented so that the entire story of the project from beginning to end, including as-built drawings, will be captured in the Butler documentation scheme. That characteristic was a key component of the decision to make W. L. Butler our choice for Grace's General Contractor.

In our initial conversation with Frank York, President of W. L. Butler, we outlined our first big dilemma: The task of generating a detailed project budget will cost money (on the order of \$20,000), but the money won't be available unless and until the Congregation officially votes to proceed with Phase I construction. But the Congregation cannot approve the project without knowing what it will cost. In

(generous!) response, York offered to provide Grace with a preliminary budget estimate in time to support a presentation to the Congregation before summer is upon us. This budget evaluation will be done at no charge and with no contractual obligation. Thus, Butler is beginning work for Grace on faith, without requiring payment or even approval paperwork of any kind. Clearly, our relationship with W. L. Butler is off to a great start!

Butler is aware of the tight timeline involved in soliciting Congregational approval before the end of May. The Project Leader and the Estimator from Butler have already spent more than three hours on campus with our architect, Pastor Matt, Jim Schlatter, and Doug Hohbach, looking methodically over the scene from the shingles on the rooftop to the heater in the basement—a tour not for the faint of heart, by the way!

You can anticipate hearing lots more details over the next several weeks as we lead up to a Special Congregational Meeting to consider and, we hope, authorize a launch of Phase I construction. Meanwhile, rest assured that your Building Team is continuing its relentless pursuit of your interests in these exciting times. Again, if you ever want to know what's going on, just ask us!

Looking at Church in the World

During Lent, attendees at the Sunday morning Adult Forum reflected on the question "What is it to be 'church'?" through study of the Claimed, Gathered, Sent series led by Pastor Matt. During Easter we turn our attention to instances of faith in action, with Adult Forum sessions on climate change, the life of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and the key role of the German churches in the political changes 25 years ago. All are welcome! Adult Forum meets Sunday mornings from 9:45-10:30 in the Chapel. The topic for the week is announced in the weekly enotes mailing and posted on the "Welcome" board that you see as you arrive at Grace.

During Easter, we also continue the Sunday morning text study of the scriptural lessons of the day, meeting in the Fireside Room from 9:45-10:30. This is a wonderful opportunity to deepen understanding and relevance of the biblical texts read in worship. Please join us!

Looking ahead, the 500th anniversary of the beginnings of the Reformation is on the horizon, with planning underway for celebrations commemorating Martin Luther's posting of the 95 Theses in 1517. We at Grace are already thinking about our congregations' role in these events—including a trip to Germany in 2017 to mark the occasion!

Creation Stewardship: Faith|Action

How do we reconcile the urgency to take action to correct numerous and serious human abuses of God's creation with the difficulty of finding hope in the face of such an enormous task?

In our faith! Following Jesus' initiative with just a few loaves and fishes at hand, the disciples distributed what they had and somehow, the multitude of 5000 was fed. Likewise, we can begin with what we have, join with others doing the same, and the challenge will be met.

Yes, creation is big, and no one can take on the the whole thing. The opportunities are many: concerns for clean air, clean water and clean land, the value of open space as a place for spiritual renewal, the loss of species or special ecosystems and protecting the ones that still survive, whether it is wise to release genetically modified organisms into the

environment and into our food chain, outrage at the environmental injustice imposed on the powerless by powerful polluters and exploiters of the environment? Where might you begin?

A few Sundays ago Pr. Matt, preaching on the Gospel story of Jesus turning over the tables of the money

changers in the Temple, urged us to be dangerous like Jesus. Where you find good creation stewardship, praise it, and where you see bad, confront it. Communicate your views through letters to the media and to politicians. Contribute your money and your time. Decide which creation stewardship issue moves you, find an organization that addresses that issue in ways you can support, and join up.

From Christmas to Easter: Poetry

Last December I was searching online for the title and complete version of a Christmas poem I had just a fragment of, and I found the information in an essay titled "The Poetry of Christmas" published on PBS's Religion & Ethics Newsweekly website (www.pbs.org/wnet/religionandethics/). The essay was interesting, and cited a book that sounded even more interesting: Divine Inspiration: The Life of Jesus in World Poetry. I acquired a copy for the library and have enjoyed browsing through it, recently in the section on the Passion. The editors call it "an effort to bring together examples of the fresh, varied, and unpredictable ways in which the words of the Gospels have inspired poets in the past and continue to inspire poets today."

The library has a small collection of poetry books, under the call number P, including two recent volumes by Christian Wiman, the editor of *Poetry* magazine and a lecturer in religion and literature at the Yale Institute of Sacred Music. *Every Riven Thing* is a prizewinning poetry collection published in 2010, and *My Bright Abyss*:

Meditation of a Modern Believer, is a meditation on faith and poetry in the context of the author's cancer diagnosis. It has received excellent reviews.

With Easter approaching, one other poetry book I enjoy is actually aimed at children. It is in the F (for Festivals) section because I think it can be equally enjoyed by adults. *At Jerusalem's Gate: Poems of Easter*, by Nikki Grimes, is a collection of simple poems expressing the thoughts of participants and observers of the Passion. It is beautifully illustrated with woodcuts.

All of the above books are currently on display with other Lent and Easter books in the library. I have also left copies of "The Poetry of Christmas" essay, and another, "On Easter and Updike," on the magazine table in the library.

Council Notes

The church council has been busy this spring on multiple fronts. Each one of our council liaisons have reported that the committees at Grace have great plans in place for 2015. Additionally, the council has had Elizabeth and Tim share a retrospective on 2014 along with their goals for 2015 - we're very thankful for their talents and commitment to creating vibrant youth and music programs.

A major focus area for the council has been transitioning from the successful capital campaign to seeing our collective vision fulfilled through a building plan. To that end, the building team has taken several important steps to move the exciting campus master plan project forward. A general contractor has been selected, and the contractor is working with our architect to create a cost estimate tied to our project's specifications. Look for a congregational meeting to be scheduled in mid-May where we'll review the specific building proposal and seek the congregation's

formal approval for the loan that's necessary to fully fund the construction. The building team also plans to hold some informational question-and-answer sessions in late April/early May between church services. So, we hope you can attend those to see the specific architectural drawings and learn more about the proposals.

The council has also reflected on the opportunity to enhance Grace's ministries through the potential addition of a part-time associate pastor. We're excited by this possibility but also recognize that the financial viability of this depends on an enthusiastic response to this year's stewardship campaign. As you make your giving decisions for the coming year, thank you for prayerfully considering this kairos moment.


