"Anna Wiersma, ten years older than I, who grew up in Amsterdam during WWII did many things to help the unfortunate. She was a dear friend and a prayer partner. We, and Ann's husband Hylke, too, worked with Les Roberts in Grace's kitchen on Tuesday nights feeding the homeless and others in need. Cold, wet, rainy night: shivering man came in for the hot meal. Ann popped out of the kitchen, probably with a couple of tea towels from the pantry to dry his soaking feet, and pulled off her own long socks to put on him, saying they were dry and warm." – Jan Curtis "The most generous act I think I have witnessed came when Andrew and I were visiting his parents in Maryland nearly twenty-five years ago. While we were having dinner with them, my husband's cousin, Matt, who was going to grad school nearby, stopped in. He was clearly distraught and through tears told us that his brother had just died. Immediately, my father in law, Lou, got up from the table gave him a reassuring hug, and whisked him away to listen to Matt process his grief for over an hour. Lou continued to be a support for him throughout this sorrowful time.
